From the Rector's Desk . . ./

It is the beginning of a new calendar year, a time when we often look back at what has been and forward to what may be. We may even set some goals, make some resolutions. I share with you some words from Becca Stevens in her book, hither & yon: A Travel Guide for the Spiritual Journey. Becca understands "hither and yon" as representative of the destination as well as the journey. It is the ideal of traveling free, to be in the reach of God everywhere. It is not something to be gained; it is simply experienced every now and then by the grace of God.

The Eternal Timeline

It takes less than a moment to get to hither and yon, but we spend our whole lives making our way there. The best way to get there is to give up thinking about linear time. The mantra "it's the journey and not the destination" is applicable.

There was a mystic who prayed constantly for visions. After years of praying, he saw an illumined, wooded meadow and realized that he was in the presence of God. As the moment passed, he awoke aching for the vision to return. He said that it was humbling to wait for that moment of communion for so long and then to have it pass so quickly. He spent the next few years praying to return to the place of union with God.

Many faithful pilgrims spend their lives in the work of prayer and meditation and love of their neighbors. Some talk of longing for years to hear God's voice. A few speak of the absence of God for years. And one speaks of the fear of God's forsaking him just before his death. It will take our whole lives to see where the journey is headed, and so in the meantime we fill it with right actions and spiritual disciplines that make the traveling lighter.

In hither and yon, time is not a constant. It is relative, depending on where we are standing on the timeline of life. Imagine for a moment a long line segment stretched out. The first point on the line is the moment of our birth; the last point is the time of our death. All points in between are markers—for birthdays, significant events, tragic losses, major decisions. There is a point for this moment. The points around this moment seem to have more space between them than the points ten years ago. In fact, most of the points five years ago have blurred

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together into a single point. Points farther out into the future seem almost impossible to reach. But what if from this present point we can see no others? What if there isn't a line at all—just a dot that is this moment? We can stand on it, completely content that we are not moving forward or backward. We are just resting on a point that is the representation of our lives.

That point is the eternal moment; and if we choose to, we can live in that moment. That is the point I am seeking. Even as I am driving my kids to school and typing these words on a screen, I am trying to stay on the point. The invitation of hither and yon is to stay on the point and fill the moment, knowing that we are standing with God and that is enough.

As mentioned last month, we have contracted with a provider for our Trinity columbarium to be built and positioned against the south facing exterior wall of Stone Hall (opposite Rite-Aid). Bill Terry and I will be meeting

with prospective contractors for the foundation work and hopefully break ground while weather conditions permit.

That said, if you are considering the purchase of a niche for yourself or loved ones, keep in mind that the preconstruction cost of \$800 will expire once ground is broken. We will certainly announce that date once determined. And please feel free to discuss with us payment terms that suit your needs and circumstances. Additionally, we will be approaching the several funeral homes in our community, offering space in our columbarium.

A most important item to mention here is that you be mindful of the physical dimensions of the niche when choosing an urn. This is especially so if you are considering a companion urn providing a resting place for you and a loved one, etc. The niche measurements are...... 13 L x 11 7/8 H x 11 7/8 W

If you are considering more than one urn per niche, please reach out to Bill, Rev Sherry or myself as we have access to a few urn styles and sizes in which you may be interested.

We are excited to be moving forward with this venture and part of the Trinity experience. And we want to be sure to comfortably accommodate the needs of the Trinity family and members of our community.
