From the Rector's Desk . . .

#### By the Reverend Sherry Deets

This month, as I continue to reflect on 150 Years of Faith in Coatesville, I share with you from Becca Stevens book *Letters from the Farm: A Simple Path for a Deeper Spiritual Life.* This excerpt is entitled Old Ways, New Visions.

This letter is as close as I can find to a prayer for readers. It's a prayer to remember that most of our faith practices were a gift from older generations. The visions we see and the dreams we dream are formed in the context of old readings, old mountains, and old lore. On the farm, maybe more than any other venue on earth, we learn from those wiser. There is a shrine of wisdom and lore offered to those of us who are novices about what to plant and when; how to keep vermin out, how to space plants and when to water. Farming may be a natural instinct but learning to grow plants is a gift from those willing to pass on the wisdom we are able to take to heart. We listen, we mimic, we absorb, and we improve our skills for the practice. It is especially true when you are using what you grow for healing. It is actually the "old wives' tales" that hold the truth about which plants can be used for which ailments. It was an eighty-year-old farmer who taught me how to make a tea from yellow root to heal a mouth sore. She had learned it from her grandmother, who collected yellow root in the spring when the kids didn't have enough vitamin C in their diets and were suffering. It was an old man down the street who taught me how to lay tobacco leaves on a sting to pull out the pain. It was my grandmother who taught my mom to give me cinnamon to feel better when I ached.

Would that we were so willing to learn from the old teachers concerning our faith! Instead of dismissing old practices like fasting, anointing, and meditation, what if we took them closer to heart? We could listen with an acute sense of the gift and take it to heart enough to practice the old skills. There is an art to practicing our faith just like practicing our farming and our cooking. It is a pilgrim's search for the heart. All the spiritual practices we cultivate are bound up in our longing to find communion with the eternal. We don't have to start from scratch. We can start with a deep pocket of knowledge offered to us by our forefathers and mothers who saw the same world and experienced the same longings.

Last night a group of thirty women gathered in my living room to talk about the history and purpose of the circle in our Magdalene community. The group was comprised of women survivors who have made their way from the streets and prisons into a healing circle where they have the time and space to find what they need to live into their sobriety. They held hands and wept in gratitude as we closed the evening. One woman said she was just ten days off the streets and, while she was completely lost still, she trusted that her sisters were going to show her the way. Then she said, "I have already learned that a grateful heart will keep me safe." Her tears were a symbol of all the gratitude for all the women who kept the circle going until she could make her way into the center of it. We do not always know how to live deeply into our faith; we do know that many others have kept the faith going until we could find our way into our own truth. Celebrate the old ways, celebrate the old saints, and then see what new visions and dreams arise.

#### Bishop's Office Hours held at Trinity

The Bishop is holding office hours at various parishes throughout the Diocese in an effort to build relationships; to make it easier for members to meet with him and with the staff. As part of our 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebrations, the Bishop held office hours at Trinity and we were very happy to host the Bishop and the various Staff members that came out. They were able to visit our historic displays as well as meet with the various people who had arranged appointments. Trinity arranged an appointment with the Bishop and had special visitors from the Coatesville community: Sonia Huntzinger (Coatesville Economic Development Coordinator) and Linda Lavender-Norris (Coatesville City Council President). They came together to speak with the Bishop about the planned development and community building that is happening, and going to happen, in Coatesville. We were so thrilled to hear Linda say Bishop Gutierrez is also "her Bishop"!

#### **Building Improvement Updates**

You may have noticed that our hallway has received a facelift! New flooring and paint have made a difference. Special thanks go to the Women's Group who donated \$2000 toward the new flooring and to Pam Smyth, who also contributed toward the floor. Professionally done directional signs will be appearing soon on the walls to assist our visitors in finding their way through. Special thanks the Haaks' for their contribution toward signage. A small group is forming to choose art for the walls to further enhance the hallway appearance.

You will have also noticed the large piece of equipment outside the of the Sanctuary walls. Victorian Heritage has been repairing the disintegrated mortar between our stone. This is being done in order to stop the water damage to the interior of the sanctuary. They have discovered much more damage than initially anticipated, so the cost of repair has doubled. One of the strange blessings of the non-stop rain this summer was in discovering all of the places in which our mortar was an issue. As always, we welcome any contributions toward our building improvement/historic preservation fund.

Our beautiful wood sign, made by our own Maitland Harvey, was recently refinished and is looking much 'healthier' now. And kitchen renovations are planned, but it will be a few months until we see these exciting renovations taking place.

#### **Eternal Light Memorial Gift**

At the end of September, we dedicated a new 'Eternal Light' to hang over our Aumbry (where the consecrated elements are stored). The light signifies to those entering the church whether there are consecrated elements in the aumbry or not. If the light is 'on', there is reserved sacrament present, if the light is 'off', the is not. This light was a gift to the church in memory of Bob Fleck and his mother, Esther Fleck, given by their family. Thank you, Fleck family, for the wonderful memorial gift!

## 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Gift to the Church of Chalice and Paten

Trinity received a beautiful new Chalice and Paten given by the Women's Group in honor of our 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Our Bishop dedicated this new set when he was present with us for worship at the beginning of October. We are enjoying using this new set for our regular service on Sunday mornings!

#### **Thanksgiving Day Morning Prayer**

Thanksgiving Day is November 22 and what better way to begin a day of remembering all that we have to be thankful for by participating in Morning Prayer. We give great thanks to God for all that we have and all that we are! Morning Prayer will be held at 9 a.m. in the Sanctuary. Join us.

## 150th Anniversary Time Capsule

We will be finalizing the gathering of items to be placed in our time capsule in the next two months. Our anniversary year will end on December 31<sup>st</sup> and therefore, the capsule will be placed in the original stone altar during our church service on Epiphany (January 6<sup>th</sup>). Epiphany is the celebration of the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi. The Magi brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the baby Jesus. Our theme for this anniversary year of giving involved 'gold, frankincense and myrrh'. What better feast day to gift the contents of our time capsule for future generations to discover.

#### **The Trinity Columbarium**

We are moving forward with the Trinity columbarium for the needs of Trinity members, family and friends. A representative of a preferred supplier has met with Rev. Sherry, Committee Member, Bill Terry and Treasurer, Minnie Kirwin to bring us closer to awarding the bid and beginning construction.

#### **Product**

The columbarium will be a respectful, tasteful and attractive multi-niche resting place of eternal peace for those who have passed. Each niche will be capable of holding two urns and will be inscribed with the names of the departed within along with dates of birth and passing. An area/garden of peace and reflection will border the columbarium.

#### PERPETUAL CARE

The columbarium will be a permanent part of Trinity Episcopal Church whose maintenance and operation will be overseen by a Columbarium Committee as approved by Vestry. This will include perpetual care.

#### Cost

Trinity is offering its family the opportunity to purchase niches at a favored pre-construction cost or at an ongoing cost at time of need. Additionally, space in the columbarium will be available to non-Trinity members of the community, so the number of niches will be limited and available as supply lasts. A pricing schedule for each is shown below......

- Members Pre-Construction \$800.00
   Ongoing at Time of Need \$1,000.00
- Non-Members Pre-Construction \$1,200.00 Ongoing at Time of Need - \$1,500.00
