From the Rector's Desk . . .

As summer begins to fade into a new season, and we rekindle our energies and focus on developing our Thistle Hills ministry, I'd like to share an excerpt from Becca Stevens' book, Letters from the Farm: A Simple Path for a Deeper Spiritual Life. She entitles this "You Are What You Grow" and it is based on one of my favorite verses from scripture, Isaiah 40:31 "But those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint."

We don't always pray what we believe; sometimes we pray what we hope to believe. This letter is a reminder that our lives become what we grow. In my life I have learned to plant and to pray love is the most powerful force for change in the world. I have tried to raise this belief daily in my work and prayer life. Because I have longed to believe that for so long, I am coming to believe it more and more. I have learned slowly but surely to believe that hearts don't break. They pour out like a flooded river forgetting her boundaries, upturning old oaks and turning fallow fields into ponds. Hearts pouring out flood us with tenderness and tears as their unstoppable force draws us in. When hearts pour out, it is possible to imagine that justice can follow in its wake.

Isaiah's heart did not break amidst the pain of banishment and the loss of his nation. Instead, in words and deeds, he poured out his heart to God for never abandoning the people. Isaiah reminds us even in our doubt, we can be faithful—even in our weariness, we can be strong. Isaiah's life is like a rushing river whose course carved its own path deeper and wider as the rains came.

Prophets and disciples pour their hearts out with an unwavering belief that this torrent of love is strong enough to change the world. Their meandering path from calling to vocation as a voice for love and justice may begin as winding as a river, but it makes its way toward stronger waters. Their witness to love itself is beyond measure, exposing the old stone bedrock of our hearts. The ancient and modern disciples open the flood gates of generosity, compassion and tenderness so no one has to live in isolation, cynicism, or fear.

This story of love poured out like a river has continued down through the ages and remains the powerful calling of our lives. Martin Luther King Jr. practiced throughout his life the tremendous power of love. On the day before his assassination he spoke to a community in Tennessee of Amos's call for justice to roll down like waters and righteousness like a mighty stream. Then he told his audience that when God calls, we need to be with Amos and the prophets who speak faithfully of love and justice. Dr. King used the term *ahimsa*, made

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famous in the West by Gandhi during the movement to free India. The term means that within each of us there is a nonviolent soul force. *Ahimsa* is as old and deep as the waters running through this earth. It is the basis for the message of Jesus, the Buddha, and all the prophets. Love is a force as old as the earth and when it is poured out for the world, nothing can stop it.

The harsh realities and hurt imposed by violence, poverty, trafficking, racism, disease, and frailty cannot break hearts. I know love is stronger than that. When Thistle Farms started to make healing oils, we chose *ahimsa*, the soul force of love, as our first blend. We have tried to be a witness to love's force. There have been seasons when the creek bed was dry, but we went on faith that water was running somewhere. Other times we have witnessed love pouring like the glory of a rushing river. I now sit in our meditation circle at Thistle Farms and marvel at a room packed with folks from England, Iceland, Bolivia, Arkansas, Texas, Oklahoma, and Georgia. They have come to sit with us and hear our healing message of love. One woman said she drove from Kentucky for "a cup of coffee and a good word." People are thirsty for the waters pouring from the river of love where the promise of justice lives.

Let us pledge our whole lives to pouring our love out for the sake of the whole world. Not because we believe it, but because we want to become love and believe in its transformative power in this world. Growing powerful love is how we live into the truth of the prophecies of Isaiah, Martin, and the community of Thistle Farms. Let us pour out our love as we embark to spread this good news of *ahimsa*. We are living proof that the war on poverty and for freedom is still being waged in the name of love. We are a living testimony, as long as we keep preaching every day of our lives in our words and deeds that love is the most powerful force for social change in the world.

Questions for reflection:

Where does ahimsa flow within you?

What time of doubt in your life eventually brought you clarity and strength?

Once the menu has been designed, items are added to the list of things to be purchased. Volunteers offer to provide menu items during the many phone calls and texts. Outside sources provide cost saving contributions; especially Wegman's and Beaver Creek Tavern.

Our volunteers each month help to do tasks; with or without being asked. Some are from neighboring Episcopal churches like Advent and St. Andrews; even other denominations; some are neighbors and friends of Trinity, such as Donna Schneider, Coleen Beckershoff, Rachel & Mason Kirkner.
