From the Rector's Desk . . .

Dear Friends,

The weather is finally turning warmer, and many will be planting gardens, flowers, etc. this month after the possibility of a frost is past. Joyce Rupp, in her book, *May I Have This Dance? An Invitation to Faithful Prayer Throughout the Year* writes about gardening:

Working in a garden can be hard work. I don't mind digging out weeds and I like to gather vegetables and fruit, but I detest readying the soil for the planting. After a long, hard winter the ground can be packed solid from heavy snows or pelting, drenching rains. The soil can be difficult to turn over. It resists the hoe or the garden tiller and it may take many hours of tiring work before the earth is soft and porous.

This part of gardening is essential, however, if green shoots are to push their way through the soil. A garden that has a hard, packed surface will not be able to receive the life-giving moisture of the spring rains. The water will run off and fail to soak the soil. Earth that is turned over is essential for a garden's watering.

The human spirit is much like a spring garden. If growth is to happen, it too must be made ready. The human spirit must be opened up if God's goodness is to grow there. Open minds and hearts are ready to receive the abundant life God constantly offers.

This kind of opening up is at the heart of the Easter story. It begins with a wide-open tomb. Beside it stands a messenger of God asking compassionate women to open their inner selves, encouraging them not to be afraid. As they listen they hear a profound and startling message: "He is not here, for he has risen..." As their minds and hearts struggle to accept this tremendous surprise they are like gardens being readied for watering. The women open their hearts to the great announcement, receive the word of resurrection like thirsty soil, and hurry away to share the marvelous news with others.

In our personal experiences of resurrection, there is the element of surrender and vulnerability. We are required to let go of our own agenda. We would like to plan this

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watering and refreshing of our souls ourselves. Just as surely as we find the date for Easter on the calendar, we want to know when our hearts will be filled with joy again.

We also need to let go of our fearful questions: If I open up, will I be watered and nourished? Or will I be left open to dry out? Will I be barren and empty? Or will I be drenched and swallowed up by rains that never seem to stop? It can be difficult to let go of our insecurity. We are called to wait, to be open, expectant, and ready, believing with all our hearts that new growth will come.

God is with us, providing for us, watering our inner gardens. We will not be washed away nor will we be left dry forever. We simply must wait, in hope, with open minds and hearts. The rains will come and when they do, they will sing in our soul like an Easter alleluia.

As we enter into the resurrection stories [in church this May] let us hear God coaxing us to be open like the way a welcome rainfall coaxes green out of a thirsty, dry garden. Let us hear God saying to us:

- Open up your mind and heart
- Put aside your strong expectations
- Lay down the arms of your inner violence
- Give up your set ideas
- Turn away from your winter worries
- Let go of your oppressive fears
- Be willing to be insecure for a while
- Allow surprise to take over your heart

Easter is about openness, about God coaxing growth from the turned over soil of our spirits. God waters the gardens of our hearts. Are we open and ready to receive the seeds of grace? Will the green shoot of divine life spring up in our inner gardens?
